


CO 8/9 RAR





'Cos the hurt would be large.




The Adjt and Bn 21C plot world domination (Officer Training) during a quiet moment at OA.




The late arrivals were not quick enough to salvage the comp however, with the team running short of the Grand Final, but the games were enjoyed and a good time was had by all.



8/9 AUSTRALIAN RULES CLUB


Well, we've come to the end of yet another year, a very successful, all be it in the end controversial, year.

It should also be noted that Cameron Lutz also received the prize of 'Best and Fairest' in the competition, a prize which he thoroughly deserved.







Other significant events during the period include:


The promotion of a number of Part Time Service personnel o NCO rank;

attended in my military career.


LCPL R&I Summers-Taylor - Computers? I can fix'em or then again I could always f--k 'em.







SUPPORT COMPANY




